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BIP program "Pathways: Historical Tourism and Mobility Studies" offers a comprehensive curriculum blending tourism, history, cultural studies, and practical skills. It is divided into virtual and physical part. Students will complete a historical research project in form of presentation and a professional internship for practical experience. Field trips and study tours to significant historical sites enhance on-site learning. Guest lectures and workshops from industry experts provide additional insights and skill-building opportunities. The program emphasizes the economic and socio-cultural impact of tourism, policy development, and strategic planning from end of the 19th Century to the present. Students will have a deep understanding of historical tourism, proficiency in heritage management, and strong research and analytical skills.

Tourism in a planned economy; Is tourism an engine of growth? The Asian, South American, African and Oceania countries' experiences; China in a globalized world. Tourism development in Asia; Strengths and weaknesses of tourism in Africa. The development of transportation sectors and their relationship to tourism. Mass vs. individualized tourism, using examples like train vs. automobile. Aviation (quite important due to the reduction in travel time). Cultural reminiscences of tourism. Promotion (consumption, advertising, and its forms).)
